

Dr. Martha Rozelle has 30 years experience in public policy development, third-party facilitation, process design, and conflict resolution for a wide range of projects. As a result of her extensive experience in the application of different collaborative problem-solving techniques, she has facilitated a consensus or designed effective communication strategies for more than 400 forums and citizen committees. She recently completed the design and facilitation of a series of workshops for the San Juan River Basin Recovery Implementation Plan, designed to help recover the Colorado pike minnow and the Razorback sucker, while allowing water development to continue in the San Juan River Basin.

Under contract for the Central Arizona Project she designed and facilitated a two-year collaborative multi-stakeholder engagement process for the identification and distribution of future water supplies for central Arizona. 80 points of consensus were achieved and in March 2010 the CAP Board of Directors unanimously approved the plan. In January of 2010, she designed and facilitated a three-day workshop with five federal agencies to formulate alternatives to the withdrawal of 1 million acres around the Grand Canyon from uranium mining. BLM is the lead agency in cooperation with the USFWS, USGS, Grand Canyon National Park (NPS), and the Coconino National Forest.

Dr. Rozelle has extensive experience working with renewable energy projects. She led the stakeholder engagement program for the siting and permitting of the Solana Generating Station, a 280MW solar generation facility west of Gila Bend, AZ; Southern California Edison's Tehachapi Renewable Transmission Project, which interconnects renewable wind energy to the existing electric system; facilitated six ½-day stakeholder workshops for Arizona Public Service for its long-range resource allocation plan, of which renewable energy was a large part; several highly controversial public meetings/workshops for the Coronado National Forest for the proposed Rosemont Copper Mine EIS; stakeholder workshops at national scoping meetings (7 locations across the country) and DEIS review for the revision of the Grand Canyon Colorado River Management Plan; facilitated sessions, on behalf of Salt River Project, with federal and state agencies to define and delineate critical habitat for the Southwestern Willow Flycatcher at Roosevelt Reservoir; and directed the public outreach program for the U.S. portion of a 1,900-mile natural gas pipeline from northeastern British Columbia to Illinois.

She is a founding member and Past President of the International Association for Public Participation and a roster member for the US Institute for Environmental Conflict Resolution.
